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Land Art Schlosspark Wagenitz by Takayuki Daikoku

In the midst of the enchanted grove and natural beauty of Schlosspark Wagenitz Takayuki Daikoku has further enhanced this idyllic space with various sculptural ensembles. The Japanese artist who lives in Havelland has the capacity to connect two cultural areas – the Japanese and the European/German. The imprint of his native country in terms of art and (garden) culture, the encounter with and the experience of the European and international contemporary art world, as well as the traditions of the local garden- and landscape art have lead the artist to an unique language of forms. It is no coincidence, that his sensitive, somewhat vegetable like, yet abstract artworks integrate effectively within the landscape park in Wagenitz. It is a uniquely successful example of how contemporary art can symbiotically interact with a landscape park and nature.

The artist recently has exhibited at nearby Schloss Ribbeck with the Berlin based painter Susanne Knaack in *Landscapes and Gardens*, an exhibition which I did curate. It was focusing on the artist's indoor sculptures and tried to communicate this Land Art project to wider ausdience.

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Cosmos (outdoor)


With *Cosmos* the artist has brought together differing vegetable like forms to compose a large ensemble-artwork. Thus, the diversity of his creative process can be comprehended and how the artist has been inspired by nature. Takayuki Daikoku is not imitating nature, but has succeeded through his artistic approach in interpreting essential charcteristics of nature (form and construction, growth and decay, as well as movement) in order to create something new. His own cosmos has been created and consequently he has given this artwork this title.



renmen-Ensemble (outdoor)


As was the case with the creators of historic parks, who created a fascinating experience via axes with vanishing points, eyecatching solitaire sculptures and small singular pieces of architecture, the artist has used the ensemble of five sculptures to achieve an additional artistic focus within in the park. Takayuki Daikoku has taken advantage of the principle of the series, which has since postwar modernism become a solid component of contemporary art. By crossing through the park the perspectives change permanently and thus the constellation of this ensemble. The walker is given a particularly intensive space (nature)time experience.

Also in the detail of Daikoku's composite-sculptures it appears that the artist has fused the traditions of his cultural homeland with his experiences of his life in Europe/ Germany. Wrapping with Japanese paper and tying with strings and cords belongs distinctively to Japanese cultural tradition, whereas the multiplication of the single element towards a whole points out the characteristics of the serial, which has proliferated, among others, since international Pop Art in Contemporary Art.

A smaller indoor version, which can be understood as a draft, was first realised by the artist in 2013 for his solo exhibition at Semjon Contemporary. Please refer to the gallery homepage.








